Like many other telegraph terms which originated to the landlines, CQ was brought over into radio and used as a general call to all ships by the Marconi Company. Other companies used KA until the London convention of 1912 which adopted CQ as the International General Call or "Attention" signal. CQ still means, literally, "Attention" but in Amateur Radio its meaning is perhaps more accurately described by Thomas Raddell who compared it to yelling "Hey, Mac:" Down a Drain Fipe." - Louise Ramsey Moreau, WB6EBO/W3WRE.

ST Interest Survey.

The survey conducted among our Roanoke Division membership during 1968 to establish reader preferences among QST departments (reported in the July, 1968 Membership Letter) revealed a rather startling likeness to the results of a poll conducted by Headquarters about twenty years ago. One exception: Our poll disclosed a significantly higher interest today in membership correspondence.

100 KC Crystal Calibrator.

Harmonics 100kc apart along the frequency spectrum are generated by this Colpitts (Pierce) crystal oscillator circuit. A minimum of parts allow compact packaging for use as a battery operated portable "secondary standard". Output can be coupled directly to receiver's antenna terminal for optimum signal transfer or radiated via a plug-in antenna.

The figure shows a common-emitter configuration with collector to base feedback. Capacitors Cl and C2 form a voltage divider across the crystal with the connection between the capacitors grounded. Sufficient voltage developed across C2 is applied 1800 out of phase between base-emitter of the transistor to cause oscillation. Oscillation frequency is determined by the crystal and capacitor combination.
