For the first time, W4CA participated as 5A Virginia operating CW and Phone on the same bands using filtering assembled by Jimmy – KS4KX. At different times during the weekend, W4CA could be heard on everything from 2 meters thru 8 meters along with APRS, packet, and Satellite.

A variety of visitors stopped by to see the demonstration of amateur radio and emergency operations. All got an opportunity to operate at the GOTA station in addition to a

tour of the various other stations. Visitors included Steve Clinton, Botetourt County's Chairman of the Board of Supervisors and Mike Guzo, Emergency Manager for the City of Roanoke. Several School Board members from various local school systems who were familiar with the RVARC's sponsorship of school programs also made the pilgrimage to learn more of ham radio. And did you see us on TV?? At least those who went home overnight could.

Field Day 2006 will leave many memories with the participants. Intrepid scandalmonger K4HVB reported on the midnight bandit whose joy ride thru the camp yanked the generator power cord to the 20m/80m trailer loose while stripping it to the bare copper. While one operator spent the next several hours swimming in a soaked sleeping bag, at least the equipment in the tent remained dry. 2006 Roanoke Valley Hamfest, by AB4A

The Roanoke Valley Amateur Radio Club's annual Hamfest will be Saturday August 5 at William Byrd High School, 2902 East Washington Ave., Vinton, VA. The inside show opens at 8 a.m. with drawings for the main door prizes at 2:30p.m .The show wraps up at 3:00p.m. The main door prize this year will be cash. The talk-in station will be W4CA on the 146.985 –600/PL 102.7 repeater. Club members

will be available to help with inside vendor setup on Friday from 5:00 p.m.-7p.m. and Saturday starting at 6 a.m. Admission is \$5 per person. Tailgate spaces are an additional \$5 per double space (park in the back space and sell in the front space of the paved parking lot) or inside tables are available at \$10 a table (airconditioned cafeteria) plus admission fee.

Breakfast and lunch will be available at a reasonable price and the food is good. There will be a hospitality room for the inside vendors from 6:00 a.m. to 7:45 a.m. at which time the space becomes the general dining area. There is an additional outside area to eat.

VE exams are offered at 11:00a.m. This will be the new exam questions that go into effect July 1, 2006. Be sure to bring photo identification, an original and copy of current licenses and/or any CSCE held along with \$14.

There will be various demos and speakers to be announced. Free bingo with great prizes is offered for the wives.

William Byrd High School is located just past Vinton on Route 24/ Washington Ave next to the Blue Ridge Parkway interchange.



Blue Ridge Bonanza by K1SO

There are many ways to travel and experience the "All-American Road" the Blue Ridge Parkway winding along 469-miles of ridge lines and mountaintops across Virginia and North Carolina's scenic Appalachian Mountains. You can either drive the road or now you can

travel the route by making contact via Amateur Radio with mobile and portable stations located on the picturesque trail.

This well known scenic roadway goes thru some the most beautiful state and national parks in the county, connecting the Shenandoah National Park, Virginia at one end with the Great Smoky Mountains National Park in North Carolina at the other The Parkway surrounds the traveler with natural beauty of native forest lands and mountain pastures on both side of the highway. At a speed limit of 45 mph the journey could take several days to cover the entire Blue Ridge Parkway. So why not travel along with Amateur Radio and check in with all the locations during the multi-state special event.

On September 16th and 17th clubs in Virginia and North Carolina will activate stations all along the Blue Ridge Parkway. The Roanoke Valley Amateur Radio Club along with members of the Lexington Amateur Radio Club, Lynchburg Amateur Radio Club, Franklin County Amateur Radio Club and Forsyth Amateur Radio Club, and other volunteers will operate from various locations also the route starting with Rockfish Gap (mile post 0) and ending in Cherokee in North Carolina (mile post 455.7).

The Saturday and Sunday times for 20 meter and 40 meter operations will begin at 1300 UTC (9:00 a.m. EDT) and end at 2100 UTC (5:00 p.m. EDT) each day. Along the route locations such as the Natural Bridge, Peaks of Otter, Explore Park Mabry Mill and Blue Ridge Music Center all in Virginia and Cumberland Knob (mile post 217.5) and Linville Falls and Mount Pisgah in North Carolina will be activated. Traveling along the Parkway and on the National Park Service web map, you will see numbered mileposts starting with zero and running south. Each station location will give the name of their location along with the milepost number and county. More than a dozen locations will on the air for the weekend special event. Twenty (20 meter) meter stations will be spaced from 14.205 MHz to 14.285 MHz and on forty (40 meter) meter stations will be spaced from 7.225 MHz to 7.283 MHz.

There will ample opportunities to contact and collect each location along the Blue Ridge Parkway. They can be redeemed for panorama photo QSL cards and Certificates of the Special Event. Request for QSL cards can be sent to W4CA call book address. Any other instructions will be given at the time of the contact. Multiple contacts will be placed on one card and a

contact with all locations will be earn a Special Certificate.

Plans call for the Virginia stations to sign W4CA/ (location) and for North Carolina stations to sign W4NC/ (location).

With elevations along the mountain range from 600 feet to over 4,000 feet and, with good band conditions, everyone should be able to make contact on the HF bands.

Join in the Blue Ridge Bonanza this September 2006, Watch for more information on the RVARC web site and be sure to turn on your radio and travel the Blue Ridge Parkway.

Ham Radio Scout Camp Calling Protocol Established by

ARRL and AB4A

A group of radio amateurs active with the Boy Scouts of America (BSA) have established an HF calling plan for scouting camps. Dubbed the "Scout Camps Calling Protocol," (SCCP), the plan aims to make it easier for scouts in the US and around the world to contact other scouts to meet the Radio merit badge requirements, pass traffic or to just get acquainted with other scouts and hams on the air.

Given the multitude of scout camps and time zones, SCCP proponents acknowledge that the likelihood of one scout camp contacting another specific camp would be slim. The concept depends on ham "scouters" and other interested radio amateurs *not* at camp to support scouts who are by providing contacts for them.

Here's how it works:

- Use traditional <u>scout calling frequencies</u> ±10 kHz, avoiding any nets or QSOs in progress.
- Scout camps and interested hamscouters not at camp are encouraged to get on the air at 1300, 1900, and 2100 local time.
- The SCCP uses two bands: At 1300 and 1900, use 20 and 40 meters. At 2100 use 40 and 80/75 meters.
- The recognized call will be "CQ scout camps." Transmit on the higherfrequency band starting at 5 minutes before the hour and on the lowerfrequency band on the hour until 5 minutes past.
- Scout camps, scouts and scouters are encouraged to monitor according to the plan from 1700 to 2000 UTC and from 2300 to 0400 UTC to support Scout camps with traffic or for talking with other scouts.

New Technician Class Exams Now in Effect

As of July 1, the new technician class question pool is in effect for amateur radio exams. New study guides available include Gordon West's Technician Class 2006-2010 Study Guide, the ARRL's Ham Radio License Manual Level 1 Technician which presents study information in a textbook fashion similar to the old Now You're Talking, and the ARRL's Tech Q&A, 4th edition,

that uses the question pool questions followed by the answer and a brief explanation of each. Check with Phil K4WFO before ordering ARRL manuals.

Getting Started with Ham Radio

In addition to the new study guides, the ARRL is coming out with a new book for getting on the air with your first amateur radio station. The book – due out mid July for about \$20 – covers the following areas of operation

- Selecting first radios and antennas.
- Exploring operating modes: voice, Morse code, digital and more.
- Assemble your station.
- Propagation
- How to make that first contact
- Chasing wallpaper.
