The President's Corner

Calling all club members, we need radio operators. The VA QSO party is now history and a fun time was had by all. Some stations operated from home, and some were mobile stations, but the main thrust of our entry was the club station at Douthat State Park. We had the largest turnout ever at the park, but we were hard-pressed to have enough operators to keep the station on the air for the QSO party. A lot of planning and work went in to this event and I want to thank everyone involved.

The club's FT-990 and two different antenna systems were installed and tested prior to the event in one of the most beautiful rustic locations in the state. Along with a computer system to log the event, so all that was needed was to sit down in front of the station. Why didn't we have people standing in line to operate? For the ones who did not want to spend the night, the park is located a short drive up 220 North. As a club, we chose Bath County, because it's fairly rare. From this point of view, we as a Virginia club feel obligated to keep it on the air for the whole event. This is a very low pressure, fun event with a very easy QSO exchange. It is an ideal first event for anyone starting out operating the HF bands with a bunch of great operators to get you started with first-class equipment. Out of 137 families, we need to find out how to get them in front of the station, so some the operators will not have to operate three or four hours straight. There are a lot of techs and hams without access to HF equipment to operate special events. This is the reason the club participates in special events for our club members to be able to operate the equipment. Some of these events take a large amount of timing and planning but all rely on the assistance of club members to make them a success.

The following special events are coming up: ITT Scout Day May 10, Festival in the Park May 24-25 and the biggie, Field Day June 28-29. We need radio operators for all of these events.

ITT Scout Day located at ITT Plant located just off of Plantation Road in Hollins. We operate from 8:30am to 2:30pm, teaching Radio merit badge to Boy and Girl Scouts. They need to make a contact on HF and the repeater as one of their requirements.

Festival in the Park is our best opportunity to present amateur radio to the public. We operate the club station under a pop-up tent at the base of the flagpole, which we use as an antenna support. We operate as a special event station Saturday and Sunday, and explain how ham radio works.

Field Day again will be at Crampton State Park (AB4YZ QTH) in Botetourt County. We need every club member's participation. We have a special need for CW operators.

We are going to have to cancel New England QSO Party / 7th Area QSO Party on May the third and fourth, because Ray is going to be out of town and there is a lack of operators.

Propagation was poor to awful. A severe wind storm the prior weekend disabled one WB4HS's antennas. WB4HS also had equipment trouble. The tuning knob encoder on the IC-746 failed on Monday. Over a dozen club members met at Douthat State Park on March 15 and 16. They rented cabins, put up antennas and put Bath County on the air in the Virginia QSO Party. Ray, AB4YZ, reports that W4CA made over 600 contacts and scored 103,000 points with the club's Yaesu FT-990. The main station was in the Ponton/Crampton cabin

Dave, KS4BO, and Phil, K4WFO put W4CA on digital mode, PSK31, from Douthat. I also tried digital from my home station in Salem. I think we all concluded that the PSK31 crowd is <u>not</u> State QSO Party literate.

Others put portable stations on the air at Douthat. John, K4JKA erected his portable G5RV and operated 20M for a bit on Saturday morning with his Kenwood TS-50S before the contest started. John reports that Fred, K4HVB, and Brian, KG4NIQ also set up stations.
